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WHAT IS A SABBATICAL OFFICER?

Sabbatical Officers are an elected position within Cambridge SU. They are leaders of the SU, and only those who are current students can stand for election. The key remit of the role is to represent and campaign for students, ensuring their voices are heard across the collegiate university.

All Sabbatical Officers have a manifesto of campaigns they want to run or goals they want to achieve whilst in post. Sabbatical Officers also work on policies and campaigns which have been passed by students or previous Sabbatical Officers. They will then attend university meetings, meet with and talk to students to collect their views, run events and campaigns for students and lobby for change for the benefit of the student community. If you've enjoyed student life and want to give back to students, this is an excellent role to take on a full-time, paid position where every aspect of your role is working to improve students' lives!

JOB PURPOSE

As a Vice President of the SU, alongside the other Sabbatical Officers, you will lead the political direction of the SU.

The Vice President (Education & Widening Participation) will focus on Education and widening participation within the Union and University. They will be the lead representative for students on issues surrounding their education experience at university and the equal participation of all students in university life, including fair access to study at the university.

Should an undergraduate hold this position, the President (PG) will support ensuring postgraduate education is represented, and vice versa if the role-holder is a postgraduate.

You will also be a Trustee of the Union. Trustees on the Board are legally and financially responsible for the Students' Union and its activities. The Board ensures that the Students' Union remains legally compliant, financially stable and has robust future planning. You'll be putting into practice strategic leadership and planning skills, negotiation tactics, as well as gaining knowledge on financial oversight, plus much more, which will contribute to your professional development and career boosting opportunities.

OVERVIEW OF RESPONSIBILITES

- Be the lead officer for students on issues surrounding their educational experience at university, the equal participation of all students in university life, and fair access to study at the University;
- 2. Represent students on the General Board of the Faculties if permitted by the Statutes and Ordinances of the University;
- Act as a representative of students on bodies of the Collegiate University as required;
- 4. Maintain networks to support collaboration between Student Academic Representatives including, but not limited to, the Academic Forum.

GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Represent students of the University to the University and to local and national bodies
- 2. Campaign for the rights and interests of students of the University locally and nationally
- 3. Report on meetings to the relevant Students' Union Committee(s) and Student Executive Committee
- Undertake responsibilities determined by Student Council, i.e. by taking on action from policies
- 5. Prepare proposals for action to be taken in support of the Student Council policy, which shall be submitted for approval
- 6. Deliver on the commitments made in their manifesto for election
- Be a Trustee of the SU, sharing ultimate responsibility for governing the charity and alongside the other Trustee Board members¹
