Welcome to the manifestos booklet for the 2025 Cambridge SU Leadership Elections. From July this year, the winners of these elections will be your representative for students. This year we will see a change to the Sabbatical Officer roles and will now be electing the following:

- President (UG)
- President (PG)
- Vice President (Education & Widening Participation)
- Vice President (Student Community & Societies)
- Vice President (Liberation & Welfare)

As well as the part-time voluntary position of University Councillor up for election which any student can run for and do alongside their studies.

Their manifestos are your way of deciding who you want speaking for you – so please do spend a little time reading through them, listening to what they have to say before casting your vote.

Remember that in every election, if you are not happy with any of the candidates, you may also vote to re-open nominations ("RON"). If RON wins an election, nominations for that position will be reopened and a by-election held in due course.

Voting is online via www.cambridgesu.co.uk/vote. The ballot will open at 9 am on Monday 24th February, and close at 5pm on Thursday, 27th February. Provisional Results will be announced from 7pm on Thursday, 27th February, with the Official Results being confirmed later.

We hope that these elections are enjoyable for you, and that you can engage with them as much as possible!

SINGLE TRANSFERABLE VOTE

WHAT ARE STV ELECTIONS

Under STV (Single Transferable Vote), voters rank candidates in order of preference by marking 1, 2, 3 and so on next to the names of candidates on a ballot. A voter can rank as many or as few candidates as they like or just vote for one candidate.

Each candidate needs a minimum number of votes to be elected. This number is calculated according to the number of positions and votes cast and is called a quota. The first preference votes for each candidate are added up and any candidate who has achieved this quota is elected.

If a candidate has more votes than are needed to fill the quota, that candidate's surplus votes are transferred to the remaining candidates. Votes that would have gone to the winner instead go to the second preference listed on those ballot papers.

If candidates do not meet the quota, the candidate with the fewest first preference votes is eliminated and the second preference votes are transferred to other candidates. These processes are repeated until all the seats are filled.

The winner is the candidate who reaches the 'quota' first.

The quota for each of these elections is 50%+1 of all the votes cast in that ballot.

STAGES OF COUNTING

- 1. First preference votes counted
- 2. If no-one reaches the quota, last-place candidate is eliminated
- 3. The second preferences of voters who chose that candidate are redistributed among those remaining
- 4. This continues, if necessary repeating these steps, until someone reaches the quota

Fighting Casualisation: Casualisation of Higher Education affects many postgraduate students twice: first as students, then as staff. This disproportionately impacts working class, international and otherwise marginalised students. I will build on links with UCU and J4CS to fight precarity and preserve our wellbeing both as students and as workers.



Just Transition, Just Divestment: I believe links with colonial and extractive industries like arms and fossil fuels are fundamentally opposed to the goals of an educational institution. As your postgraduate president, I will advocate for a divestment process which centres the most precarious. I will also work with STEM students to make sure they do not have to compromise their ethics to conduct their research.



Support for International Students: As an international student, I am aware of the impact that global crises have had on friends and colleagues. The university must support those affected by war, occupation, fascism and other crises. I will work to ensure the university takes a stance against rising racist anti-immigrant policies through robust provision of financial and material support for its PG students, including a reevaluation of oversees tuition fees.

Postgraduate Welfare: Recent welfare reforms have placed pastoral responsibilities in the hands of colleges. As sabbatical officer, I will work to ensure that the university upholds its duty of care to those of us who aren't involved in the collegiate life.

2. Increase Equal Opportunity for Low Income Postgraduate Students

by campaigning for access pricing for societies and ticketed events to accept proof of eligibility other than the Cambridge bursary which Postgraduate students aren't eligible for, despite their household income.



3. Ensure Both Myself and the SU are Held Accountable



by holding weekly surgeries and regular catch ups with college MCRs to raise issues that you want me to work on. I will be completely guided by student opinions, allowing your voices to be heard.

4. Improve the Admissions Process

by campaigning for deferred entry for Masters students, easier communication with the PAO, and use my experience as a graduate of the SHARE programme for underrepresented students to increase widening participation at postgraduate level.



5. Improve Access to Other Colleges

through campaigning for increased access to other colleges, organise formal swaps and bar nights available to all Postgraduate students regardless of college, so that everyone has the opportunity to access and experience everything at their own university.

6. Continue Previous Successful SU Campaigns and Initiatives

such as the SU-permarket and rent negotiation training, and ongoing campaigns for increased access to other colleges, deferred admissions for Masters students, and stopping fossil fuel funding.

My academic journey—from a small-town first-generation university student in China to studying at one of the world's most prestigious institutions—has given me a deep understanding of the challenges many postgraduate students face.

With experience in student advocacy, interdisciplinary research, and international collaboration, I am committed to ensuring that all postgraduates at Cambridge—regardless of background—receive the support, representation, and opportunities they deserve.

WHY AM I RUNNING?

Postgraduate students at Cambridge contribute significantly to research, teaching, and the wider university community, yet we often face financial pressure, housing difficulties, well-being challenges, and a lack of tailored academic and career support. We need a stronger, more inclusive, and action-driven representation that truly understands and addresses these issues.

I am standing for election as Cambridge SU Undergraduate President to improve student engagement, advocate for mental health support, and empower students to engage with social responsibility.

Enhancing Engagement and Representation

As a mature, part-time student, I know how difficult it is for those who don't fit the typical Cambridge image to engage in student life. The SU must do more to support mature, part-time, disabled, and marginalised students by addressing the issues they care about. Many are deeply concerned with housing, politics, and international affairs but lack a platform within the SU. I will work with UCU and local organisations to ensure all students feel represented.

Advocating for Mental Health Support

The mental health crisis at Cambridge is systemic. It cannot be treated as an individual issue when racism, sexism, and institutional neglect persist. The SU must push for meaningful change, ensuring student wellbeing is a top priority across the University.

Encouraging Social Responsibility

Students are increasingly aware of their societal role, from local activism to global issues. One of the most pressing concerns has been solidarity with Palestine, yet the SU has not done enough to support student campaigning. If elected, I will:

- Push the University to disclose and review financial ties with organisations complicit in human rights violations.
- Support student-led campaigns for divestment and reinvestment in Palestinian students, academics, and scholars.
- Ensure the University honours its commitments to Cambridge for Palestine, particularly in reviewing ties to arms manufacturers.
- Oppose punitive measures against students advocating for justice.
- Demand student representation in University decision-making on divestment and ethical policy.

A Stronger Student Voice

Students deserve to be heard, and the SU should be a space for real representation. If elected, I will work with students and staff to promote transparency, justice, and meaningful action on key issues.

Personal Commitment

Cambridge should be for the many, not just the privileged few. Education is a right, and factors such as wealth, class, and connections should not determine access to this institution or leadership roles. Growing up on a council estate, I struggled academically and had to fight to convince the admissions office to give me a chance at higher education.

Despite financial hardship and health challenges, I completed my degree and pursued my

dream of studying for the UK Bar, working two jobs to fund my education. I was ultimately called to the Bar by Gray's Inn. My lived experience gives me a deep understanding of financial and mental struggles.

If elected, I will fight for better funding, grants over loans, and a system that supports the most vulnerable. Your vote can help show that ordinary people can be elected and make real change. I will be your voice—loud, clear, and impossible to ignore.

What I want to do!

1. REDUCE THE WORKLOAD

- Lobby the University for reading weeks. This is paramount in ensuring that students can protect their mental and physical health to get through a term of Cambridge.
- Make 24/7 libraries the standard across colleges. People have different waking hours and this should be honoured by their college libraries.
- Proper provisions for being ill mid-term. The common cold should not mean you are three essays behind! I would ensure that there are more blanket rules about asking for extensions and that this is properly honoured.
- Freshers should not be intimidated by their supervisors! In Freshers week I would help myth bust to ensure freshers are well-equipped to go into their first supervisions willing to ask questions and ask for extensions if they need.

2. ADDRESS THE FIRST GAP

- Fix the gender gap in achieving firsts. Rethink the assessment process if it is that white, middle class men that are more likely to achieve a first at Cambridge
- Standardise college support for healthcare diagnoses. It's unjust that being at a rich college gives you a higher access to diagnosis. Reintroduce the Cranes Fund for autism and ADHD diagnoses.
- Lobby the university for proper resit provisions, across degrees.

3. LIVING IN COLLEGE

- Train JCRs to best be able to deal with their college on issues of the condition of rooms. Your college is your home and it should feel as such.
- Everyone should have access to proper kitchen facilities put electric hobs in gyps.
 Students have different dietary needs and should have the agency to cook for themselves.

4. ENSURE SAFE NIGHTS OUT

- Make plodges of different colleges safe spaces for vulnerable students in the night time. In the city centre you are never that far away from a college plodge - this should be reason to feel safe.
- Ensure JCRs have a constant supply of anti-spiking covers.
- Lobby for bag + body checks at the clubs. This would help reduce spiking and would help more people feel safe when trying to have fun.

5. THE WIDER WORLD

• Reintegrate charity with the SU. I would create another society grant specifically for Cambridge charities to ensure they can continue to operate with the full

- support of the SU behind them.
- Pressure the university to reinvest ethically and greenly. Students cannot feel supported by the University if their money is going to causes they disagree with.
- Work with Cambridge City Council and the colleges to make Cambridge greener.
 Colleges have access to lots of green space and I would campaign for some to be rewilded.





During my time at Cambridge I have been very involved in the university community, on my college JCR, May Ball committee, CamQueerHistory, and student theatre. As my college's LGBT+ Officer, I organized a range of events from a Trans Day of Remembrance installation in the chapel to a college amateur drag show. Alongside serious campaigns, it's essential students get to let off steam and have fun ("keep fighting, keep dancing"). I know how important it is to work with both staff and students to improve welfare, and pressure university institutions to implement positive change. I have been involved in political activism since school, when I organized local climate strikes and founded my school's LGBT+ action group Digon, which advised the Welsh government on new education policy. Now,

I want to put what I've learned to work in leading the political direction of the SU

1.Looking for ... sexual health support

- Given the high demand for online postal kits, and the location of the Lime Tree Clinic posing difficulties for some students, I will host STI drop-in sessions in the SU to encourage widespread testing.
- I will work with college health teams and JCR/MCRs to establish an Opt-In self reporting system to flag outbreaks in the student community.

2.Smile!

• I will continue the campaign to establish a fund for student dental care

I will be in close contact with JCRs and MCRs to inform my work at the college level, and stay accessible and contactable through feedback forms and social media bulletin summaries.

3. Gays just wanna have fun

• I will establish a fund for queer community events, giving a boost to Cambridge nightlife and the queer social scene.

4.Education that works for everyone

- I will push to have universal lecture recordings across all departments, available to all students.
- I will push for the implementation of the APP PAR recommendations to close awarding gaps.

5.Support for care-experienced and estranged students

- I will run social events during vacations, and link up existing college-based schemes.
- I will establish an online community group for care-experienced and estranged students, similar to those previously established by the SU for students with disabilities.

Additionally, I will engage with and support existing campaigns in Cambridge, such as J4CS, Cambridge for Palestine, Cambridge Zero, and Demilitarise Cambridge. I am invested in building an equitable and socially responsible university that is responsive to the values of the student community.

Having a **vibrant student experience** is essential to enjoying your time at Cambridge and growing into the person you will be afterwards. However, the wealth of opportunities at Cambridge is not currently available to all students. As **Student Community and Societies officer** my goal would be to ensure all students have access to a balanced and successful life beyond their studies. Fostering good communication between faculties, societies, and colleges is one way to achieve this. I further promise to **improve the quality of**

minoritised experience within these communities through direct action, encouraging societies to prioritise student welfare utilising open forums and student feedback.

I am aware of the issues students may have with accessing pastoral care at Cambridge and hope to remove barriers to this essential support, through **building community care**. This would involve clearer advertising of the support available and smoother access to what students need. The current system of varying support at different levels of the university does not best suit students' needs and can be improved with student feedback and the SU's communication with university bodies. I want to reduce the stigma around getting help, ensure students are listened to when seeking it, and overall **improve the quality and consistency of support at all levels**.

Having been involved with **rowing**, **my college's JCR**, **Newnham Queer Archives**, and the **university ballet club** during my time at Cambridge, I am well-versed in the way university societies function and communicate. Furthermore, as a welfare officer for **Newnham Butch Soc**, I believe I am well suited to delivering on my promises of improving student wellbeing. I am familiar with the discrepancy in funding available to smaller, college-based societies and aim to level the playing field, ensuring no one is barred from starting a society and pursuing their passions. This would involve communicating directly with colleges, the central university, and alumni to channel funds where they are most needed, ultimately making sources of funding more transparent for students.

Finally, I am dedicated to listening to student feedback regarding any toxicity or inaccessibility when it comes to sports and societies. **Tradition should not be an excuse** for cultures that alienate or behaviour that damages anyone and as your officer I would aim to make extracurriculars a safe and welcoming space for all. For example, I would introduce trans and non-binary groups for activities where these students may not feel initially comfortable, such as dance classes or gym sessions. It's also important to me, being from a state school, that everyone has access to new sports and experiences—such as rowing—that they may not have done before. I want to break down access barriers and ensure that your life outside of studying is **rich and enjoyable**.



I am an English and French-speaking Canadian born and raised in multilingual Kenya. I am the son of schoolteachers born and raised in colonial Kenya. When I was growing up, Cambridge was a distant, distant dream at best. And now I am here. I am a multilocal citizen of a globalising world, and Cambridge is one of my adoptive homes.

When I first came to Cambridge back in 2017, all I wanted to do was get a worldclass education. I had no interest in student government. I was able-bodied. I returned as a disabled student in 2023 and discovered an interest in the governance of the University. I have since served as Postgraduate Academic Representative for the School of Arts and Humanities. I am the current Disabled Students' Officer at Cambridge SU. In a bid to revive post-COVID the student societies that previously gave structure to my support system, I am serving as President of the Cambridge Canadian Club and the Cambridge East African Society, respectively.

I have gained two years of experience serving on the Council of the School of Arts and Humanities and the University's Joint Wellbeing Committee; Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Committee; Research Ethics Committee; and Library Syndicate Committee, among others.

I am imbricated (somewhat) by choice and intersectionally-positioned less so. I have lived and worked in all five inhabited continents. That bestows certain dimensions of perspective. Having experienced Cambridge as an abled-bodied younger student and now as a disabled older student, I have gained a greater appreciation of the chasm in experience that being part of an underrepresented group can create. I have experienced Cambridge in ways that provide perspectives that I believe would be very useful to the University's supreme governing organ.

Cambridge is at once an English and a global institution. Its innermost courts shall echo with the most English and un-English of voices. The strong shall carry the weak. I propose to offer some intersectional diversity to the disaggregated polyharmonies of our governance structures and help further pluralise their sensibilities.

RE-OPEN NOMINATIONS

If you are not happy with any of the current candidates standing for election, you can vote to Re-Open Nominations (RON). RON appears on the ballot and votes for RON are counted in the same way as those for candidates. If RON is declared the winner after all votes have been counted, the election will be held again. The original candidates are allowed to run again in the new ballot, but it gives the opportunity for new candidates to run.

If nominations are re-opened for one of the sabbatical positions, or a University Council position, then a new cross-campus election for those positions will be held in Easter Term.

WHY VOTE RON?

Voters may choose to vote RON for one of the following reasons:

- They do not think any of the available candidates should be elected.
- They would rather have more choice and be able to select from a greater number of candidates (not a guaranteed outcome).
- They have already ranked some candidates, but feel that none of the remaining candidates should be elected.

You do not need to vote for RON in an election, so if you think all of the candidates are better than no candidate, don't put a number next to RON on your ballott!
